The Regular Meeting of the Borough Council of Washington, Warren County, New Jersey was held in the Council Chambers of Borough Hall at 7:30 P.M.

Mayor McDonald led everyone in the flag salute.

Mayor McDonald read the following Statement into the Record:

"The requirements of the 'Open Public Meetings Law, 1975, Chapter 231 have been satisfied in that adequate notice of this meeting has been published in the Star Gazette and posted on the Bulletin Board of Borough Hall stating the time, place and purpose of the meeting as required by law.

COUNCIL CANDIDATES

Justin Jewell

Mayor McDonald asked Mr. Jewell if he owns or rents his home in the Borough. Mr. Jewell stated he is a homeowner. Justin stated that he is a volunteer fireman. He ran for a Council seat in 2008 and feels he could bring good ideas and enthusiasm to the Council. He has resided in the Borough since 2004 and is happy making his home here. Councilman Higgins asked Mr. Jewell what his reasons were for running for Council. Mr. Jewell stated he sees a need for change and accountability. Councilman Higgins asked Mr. Jewell what he thinks is the biggest issue facing the Borough right now. Mr. Jewell explained he feels it is the municipal budget and tax increases. Councilman Boyle asked Mr. Jewell if his opinions have changed at all since the original interview. Mr. Jewell stated that his opinions have not changed and he is most concerned with lowering taxes and the quality of life for citizens of the Borough. Councilman Housel stated that in this form of government, Council sets goals and policies, where do you see yourself fitting in with this Council? Mr. Jewell stated he will devote as much time as needed and will volunteer his time to the Borough whenever necessary specifically in the area of research. Councilman Cioni asked how Justin will handle an opposing vote for an ordinance or resolution. Mr. Jewell stated that he will stand by his opinion. If anyone has any questions regarding how I voted I am always available to discuss. Councilman Valentine asked Mr. Jewell to explain how he would conduct his research on important items coming up before Council. Mr. Jewell explained that garbage collection is an important

current issue facing the Council. He would research by calling other municipalities whose citizens pay for private garbage collection, comparing service and costs.

Jeanine Gleba

Mrs. Gleba stated that she owns her home with her husband in the Borough. She has been involved with many things over the years and is ready to become involved in her own community. Mayor McDonald asked if Mrs. Gleba felt that there could potentially be a conflict of interest with her husband serving as the Planning Board Engineer. Mrs. Gleba explained that she would abstain from any vote that involved her husband. Mrs. Gleba explained she was the person behind Grace's Law and is certainly not afraid of State Legislatures with all of her efforts having Grace's Law enacted. She stated she believes that this would be an asset to the Borough. Councilman Higgins asked what she feels the number one issue of the Borough is. Mrs. Gleba stated she feels the number one issue facing the Borough is fiscal responsibility. She would work to find ways to lower expenses and taxes however; she realizes there are certain necessary evils. Councilman Higgins asked why she didn't run in the recent primary election. She stated that she needed the confidence from the Republican Committee in order to pursue it and at the same time was extremely involved in Grace's Law. Councilman Boyle stated there are many responsibilities that go along with being on Council. Would she be able to commit herself to the time requirements. Mrs. Gleba stated that she will be able to commit herself to the responsibilities of Council. Councilman Housel stated this form of government purposely limits Council's involvement with the day to day operations of the Borough. Mrs. Gleba stated she actually prefers it that way and would rather focus her attention on larger projects and committees. Councilman Cioni asked how she would handle voting no for an ordinance or resolution. Mrs. Gleba stated she would vote no if the ordinance or resolution did not benefit a majority of the citizens. She stated that she would always try to have an alternate solution. Councilman Valentine asked what type of projects she would want to participate in as a member of Council. She stated she would like to see more community involvement. People have to realize that if you want your property values to increase they need to invest in their community.

Daniel Aron

Mr. Aron stated he owns his own home in the Borough. He also stated he wants to give his time to the Borough and would like to make a difference. Councilman Higgins asked what he thinks the biggest issue is facing the Borough. Mr. Aron stated it is infrastructure and the downtown. When the economy turns around, the infrastructure needs to be a focus for the Borough, on and the Borough will need to consider budgeting for those items. Councilman Boyle noted that serving on Council requires commitment and fortitude. Mr. Aron stated that he has served on the Planning Board for 8 months now and has never missed a meeting. He also explained he owns his own business and has time to designate to different committees. Councilman Housel stated that this form of government requires Council to set goals and policies. How does he see himself fitting in with this Council. Mr. Aron stated he would definitely get out and talk to the people. He

would not vote on an item based on his opinion alone. Councilman Cioni asked how he would handle voting no on a particular ordinance or resolution. Mr. Aron stated that he would discuss upcoming items with citizens and would hope that if he voted no, he would be able to bring alternate solutions to the table. Councilman Valentine asked what type of issues he would like to be involved in. He would like to focus his time on recreation, children, and infrastructure.

At this time a motion was made by Housel, seconded by Cioni to enter Executive Session.

COUNCIL APPEARANCE

Dorothy Repsher – Municipal Alliance

Ms. Repsher explained to the Mayor and Council how the Municipal Alliance funding works. The money to fund the alliance programs comes from the state of New Jersey from fines collected. The money is given back to the community based on the municipal population.

The Borough's obligation to apply for the Municipal Alliance grant is a 1/3 cash match, which is \$1,958.00 for 2010. For the last five years, the Borough has given a 100% cash match to the alliance program. With that funding we are able to run the middle school summer recreation program. This year we actually had to turn children away. Ms. Repsher explained that the biggest expense for this type of program is transportation. The Borough's social dynamic has changed over the years; our children come home to empty homes because mom and dad are working.

Ms. Repsher stated that she comes before Council tonight to ask for a 100% cash match.

Councilman Cioni asked the Borough Manager if the funds are available. Borough Manager stated that the Borough would need to budget for the entire amount in January and submit vouchers to the County to be reimbursed for their half throughout the year. Councilman Boyle asked what the alliance would be sacrificing if the town did not match the grant 100%. Ms. Repsher stated the alliance would be sacrificing transportation to activities such as Dorney Park, etc.

Councilman Higgins motioned to approve the entire amount of the cash match for the Municipal Alliance, seconded by Councilman Boyle.

Councilman Cioni stated that in this financial climate he would prefer to give the Alliance the 1/3 cash match of \$1958.00.

Chief Klausfelder thanked the Mayor, Council, and Borough Manager for all of the work done on the fire bays to accommodate the new fire truck. This was truly a team effort and very much appreciated. Chief Klausfelder also noted that the Fire Department will take care of the ceiling tiles relating to the project.

Joe Tedesco

Mr. Tedesco explained to Council he wanted to discuss taxes, the possibility of recruiting an anchor store for the downtown, and parking. An anchor store will bring necessary commerce to the area. The Borough Council needs to consider offering tax abatements to lure a large corporation to the area. This will bring necessary paychecks to the borough. Councilman Cioni explained that the BID has been working diligently to attract businesses in the downtown area. Councilman Housel also noted that part of the redevelopment plan allows for a large medical building downtown. Councilman Cioni stated the BID is undertaking the parking lot effort downtown. Mr. Tedesco also stated that businesses in the Borough should be receiving tax breaks due to the economy. Councilman Higgins explained that the Borough Council has already adopted a Borough Ordinance allowing for a five year tax abatement. Mr. Tedesco would like to see this Council and the BID do more to attract businesses and especially a large corporation to the area.

Bob Prusnick – ARC - Warrant County Chapter –

Mr. Prusnick stated that the ARC is applying for a Small Cities Community development Block Grant again this year for energy savings. The State of NJ has offered to give us another grant this year. He hopes the Council will positively consider the Resolution before them this evening. The ARC and the Borough have been great partners in the past. The ARC appreciates everything the Borough does for them.

Sandy Cerami Executive Director - BID

Ms. Cerami updated the Council on the bid process for the downtown parking lot. The BID has received fourteen bids so far. The bid opening is scheduled for August 13, 2009. She thanked the Borough Council for their cooperation and all of their hard work.

Christina Woykowski 24 South Prospect St.

Ms. Woykowski wanted to bring to the Council's attention that Council had previously adopted Resolution 101-2009 which was a resolution authorizing the Borough Charter will be placed on the website. She stated that this still needs to happen.

She also noted, regarding the Borough finances, there is a need for more accountability. The Borough has made a lot of good progress on the administration side; however Council has never met to discuss making improvements on the side of the policy makers. She stated that she found that 20% of states have their financial statements on municipal websites. We need to offer ours on the website as well. She stated that she had taken the liberty of preparing a draft Resolution regarding this and respectfully requests that Council consider this at their next meeting.

Ms. Woykowski also explained that she has been asked by several council members to tie up the loose ends with the finance committee. One of the outstanding items is regarding the financial reports. Ms. Woykowski provided a sample of a report that she would like to see based upon the needs as Council identified them. She also stated that she would like to see council approve the bill list with a separation of sewer and general accounts. There is no reason why they should be together.

Councilman Cioni noted that he is part of the website committee and the finance committee. The finance portion of the website is prepared and the only requirement is sending the reports to the website company for uploading.

OLD BUSINESS:

Municipal Garbage Collection/Budget

Manager Phelan explained that he is not asking Council to change their minds regarding the decision to go out to bid for garbage collection; however there has been a lot of debt incurred over the course of the past 8 to 12 years that is now coming due. He stated that he brings this to Council's attention so that they are aware there will be a debt payment of \$200,000.00 next year. This means the Borough will need to apply for extraordinary aid next year as well. Councilman Higgins asked if this means the Borough residents will not see a reduction in taxes if we privatize the garbage pickup. Manager Phelan stated yes. The debt is very high for the borough at 1.93%. Manager Phelan stated he is just asking that Council re-visit privatizing garbage collection.

Councilman Higgins clarified that this year's debt payment was \$600,000 and next year's is \$750,000; in reality that is only an additional \$150,000. Manager Phelan agreed.

Councilman Higgins stated it would be more cost effective to buy a garbage truck and hire two people to do the garbage pickup in the Borough.

A motion was made by Councilman Higgins to continue with the bid process, with a six month opt out clause while at the same time researching the purchase of our own truck. This motion was seconded by Councilman Boyle.

Councilman Boyle stated that recreation would like to discuss umpire fees and how these fees are paid out.

Councilman Higgins stated that he had received a complaint that there were people swimming in the pool before it was open. He also questioned the correspondence sent to the recreation committee. He asked the Borough Manager if the correspondence was in place of the phone call. Councilman Higgins stated he would discuss this with the Borough Manager later. He stated that he was under the impression that once the Borough borrowed the money for the TANS that we would be in better shape financially. It appears to him that we are not. Manager Phelan stated that it's a cash flow problem and the taxes are coming in slowly. He stated we don't have enough money in the bank to pay bills and reimburse ourselves. We are playing catch up. Manager Phelan also stated that he has reached out to the state to discuss the status of extraordinary aid. No word yet.

Councilwoman Gleba thanked Council for their confidence in her.

Mayor McDonald welcomed Councilwoman Gleba.
