Mayor McDonald led everyone in the flag salute.

Council resumed regular session at 8:30 p.m.

AUDIENCE

Mayor McDonald entertained comments and questions from the audience members for items not listed on the agenda

Chief James McDonald Washington Township Police Department

Chief McDonald stated he is here to address any concerns that citizens may have with the police department. He stated that if residents do not see police cars in their neighborhood; that is good. They are patrolling and focusing on areas that are problems. The response time to calls remains on the average seven minutes. Mrs. Sloan asked Chief McDonald how citizens be kept informed if there was something going on in their neighborhoods. Chief McDonald stated that press releases are sent to the Express Times and the Star Ledger, there are also updates on the Police Department website as well as the departments Facebook page. The department is covering the arrival and departures at schools as much as they can. Chief McDonald will address the complaints regarding overnight parking. He also stated that the DARE program will continue in the schools.

Audience member Mr. Kressler commented on the revenues that have been coming in for tickets written in the Borough; they have dropped significantly in the past year. Chief McDonald stated that the department is writing twice as many tickets in the Borough then in the Township. The Police Department has many active investigations going on and is focusing on problem areas. We will find a balance. He stated that every school day as part of their daily patrols an officer will walk through the schools. Chief McDonald informed Council and the audience that if there are ever any questions or concerns please stop in to see him or call.

Dave Hockenbury Flower Ave

Mr. Hockenbury stated he did some research on what other neighboring towns are paying in sewer rates compared to Washington Borough. In Lopatcong the sewer bill is \$12.00 per month for a family of three. In Phillipsburg it is \$16.00 for a family of four. There is a huge difference between what we pay and the other neighboring towns. He stated he has a family of two; why should he pay the same rate that a family of eight pays. Council needs to figure out another way to supplement this.

Councilman Housel arrived at 8:45 p.m.

Joe Kressler 92 Carlton Ave

Mr. Kressler commented on the \$58,000 that was in reserve at the end of 2008 in the Sewer Audit. Natasha Turchin, CFO explained to Mr. Kressler this reserve is not a fund balance or surplus; but is a reserve to pay 2008 bills (expenditures) that did not come in to the borough until 2009.

Motion to close the audience portion was made by Cioni, seconded by Gleba.

By no later than March first of each year the Recreation Director shall evaluate the costs and expenses for operating each Program/Event and make a recommendation to the Mayor and Council and Manager as to the amount to be charged for participation in the Program/Events presented by the Recreation Department, which shall be within the range of fees established by this ordinance. The Borough Council shall review the Recreation Program/Event Fee recommendations made by the Recreation Director in order to establish the current year Recreation Program Fee Schedule, which shall be adopted by the Mayor and Council via resolution annually.

SECTION 4. All ordinances and resolutions inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed as to such inconsistencies.

SECTION 5. This ordinance shall take effect immediately after final passage, approval and publication of notice thereof as required by law.

We are not comfortable introducing an Ordinance at this time; neither the BID or the Borough is in a position to undertake that kind of money for remediation at this time.

Mayor McDonald deviated from the agenda to entertain Resolution 62-2010.

Resolution 62-2010 Change Order Downtown Streetscape - Berto

Andrew Holt, Borough Engineer explained to Council that during the NJDOT reconciliation of the Berto paperwork; it was found that the original contract award contained an error. The bid, which included alternate bid items and materials, did not net out correctly. The contract should have been awarded with a lesser amount; however it should be noted that the contractor was paid the correct amount. This resolution will clear the error and allow the DOT to reconcile the paperwork and send the Borough its funds.

Councilman Higgins asked Manager Phelan what the money will be used for once it is received. Manager Phelan stated that this money combined with the money from Van Cleef will be used to pay for the parking lot. Councilman Higgins asked if this was voted on. Manager Phelan stated yes.

A RESOLUTION APPROVING THE FINAL CHANGE
ORDER RELATED TO THE WASHINGTON AVENUE

DOWNTOWN STREETSCAPE PROJECT

Berto Construction Inc. Contract
Project 2-Pipework and Project 4 - Landscaping

WHEREAS, the Borough of Washington is in the process of administratively closing the downtown streetscape project; and

WHEREAS, in order to satisfactorily close-out the downtown streetscape project a final change order is necessary for Berto Construction Inc. contract; and

WHEREAS, the Borough Engineer, Andrew S. Holt of Suburban Consulting Engineers, Inc. has reviewed the documentation relating to the downtown streetscape project and recommends that in order to satisfactorily close-out the project and secure the NJDOT grant money originally allocated for this project, a final change order is necessary for NJDOT files to summarize the original contract amount, all changes during construction and the final (paid) contract amount, and

WHEREAS, due to a clerical error, the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Washington, in the County of Warren, State of New Jersey approved an incorrect contract award in the amount of \$297,182.70

WHEREAS, the correct original contract award in Resolution 187-2006 should have been \$270,182.70

WHEREAS, detailed explanations are provided in the email dated February 16, 2010 with attachments from the Borough Engineer's Office to the Borough Manager,

WHEREAS, as a result of this resolution, the project price is not changed, as all payments to Berto Contracting in the correct amount for the project are already made in the total amount of \$276,518.09,

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Washington wish to accept the recommendations as it is in the best interest of the Borough of Washington,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Washington, in the County of Warren, State of New Jersey approve the modification in the original Berto Construction Contract Amount from \$297,182.70 to \$270,182.70 to correct the clerical error in the original contract award amount and authorize the Borough Manager and Borough Engineer to prepare the necessary documents and for the Borough Manager to execute the final change order on behalf of Washington Borough resulting in the necessary documentation to NJDOT in support of the Borough's total payment amount to Berto of \$276,518.09 which has already been made

Approval for Special ABC License – Washington Fire Department

The Borough Clerk reported that all of the paperwork is in order.

Motion made by Housel, seconded by Cioni to approve the special ABC license for the Washington Fire Department.

Discussion on Sewer Rate Increase and Consideration of Resolution 63-2010

Councilman Higgins stated that the Borough is looking at a seven dollar increase. Manager Phelan stated that is correct; seven dollars will make up for this years shortfall. Councilman Higgins asked if we know where the \$300,000 went. Tom Ferry, Borough

Auditor explained the sewer utility would have run at a \$300,000 deficit last year. When you do a budget, in the State of NJ, the budget needs to be balanced. This means your revenues must equal the amount of expenditures. He explained that last year he was able to find money to offset the deficit in the budget in order to not raise sewer rates last year. These additional sources do not exist this year.

Councilman Boyle asked if it states in the audit report; that we are running at a \$300,000 deficit. Mr. Ferry stated that it is a loss of revenue and would not be stated in the audit report.

Councilwoman Gleba stated that when the sewer utility was established it was anticipated that every three years the rates would increase because of our debt obligation. Between the year 1998 and 2005 the rates were never increased. In 2006 the rates increased to \$45.00. The Borough was able to use the fund balance in sewer to offset the budget to avoid sewer increases. The \$300,000 is not from years past; it's just to cover this year's budget.

Audience member, Rachel Semonche asked if the expenditures could be cut back. Manager Phelan stated that every departmental budget was cut back 5 to 15%; this is not a budget issue but a debt issue.

Councilman Housel offered some history on the sewer plant. He stated that the Borough had to upgrade the sewer plant otherwise the Borough would begin receiving daily fines. The Borough bonded to re-do the plant and received a very low interest rate at the time. The debt is coming due on the money borrowed to upgrade the sewer plant.

Audience member, Mr. Kressler stated that he is disappointed in council that they were not aware of this before. He stated this makes him mad that Council is spending money downtown, etc. Councilman Housel stated that this is Council's fault. According to the Borough's Sewer Ordinance; we should have raised rates every three years.

Councilman Higgins asked if there is anything in the sewer budget that we can reduce. Manager Phelan stated that there is very little to reduce. Most of our budget is debt service and contractual obligations to Veolia Water.

At this time, Mayor McDonald entertained a motion for Resolution 63-2010 and the sewer rates that need to be inserted into the resolution.

Motion made by Housel, seconded by Valentine to raise sewer rates to \$52.00 per EDU, with an annual rate of \$624.00 per year for all bills generated after February, 2010.

RESOLUTION # 63- 2010

RESOLUTION ESTABLISHING SEWER RATE PER EQUIVALENT DWELLING UNIT FOR THE BOROUGH OF WASHINGTON COUNTY OF WARREN, STATE OF NEW JERSEY FOR THE YEAR 2010.

WHEREAS, the Borough of Washington owns and operates a Sewer Utility known as the Borough of Washington Municipal Sewer Utility (BOWMSU); and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Council, under the Borough of Washington Code, Chapter 70, Article II, §5(G), have the ability to fix and collect rates, fees, rents and other charges in accordance with the law; and

WHEREAS, under Chapter 70, Article VI, §28(A)(1), the Mayor and Council have the authority to review and revise the rates for services and to establish an annual sewer charge, which shall be uniform and equitable for the same types and classes of use and services; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Council have not changed the Equivalent Dwelling Unit (EDU) rate since 2006 and upon consideration have determined the EDU rate for 2010 must be amended.

NOW, THEREFORE, **BE IT RESOLVED**, the EDU rate for 2010 shall be \$ 624.00 per year, billable monthly at the rate of \$52.00 per EDU; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the revised rate shall take effect for all bills generated after February, 2010.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Tax Collector, Chief Financial Officer and Veolia Water.

Councilwoman Gleba stated that Greenwich Township recently reduced sewer rates by 10% for senior citizens age 65 and older. She will be contacting the Borough Manager to discuss this.
