RESOLUTION 162-2016 RESOLUTION EXTENDING THE OPTION AGREEMENT FOR GRANT OF EASEMENT AND RIGHT-OF-WAY WITH NEW JERSEY AMERICAN WATER

WHEREAS, on November 7, 2014, the Borough of Washington and New Jersey-American Water Company, Inc. entered into an Option Agreement for Grant of Easement and Right-of-Way to provide New Jersey-American Water Company with the option to purchase an easement and right-of-way on a portion of Lot 78 in Block 48 in Washington Township and owned by the Borough with two (2) option periods from November 7, 2014 to November 6, 2015 and from November 7, 2015 to November 6, 2016; and

WHEREAS, New Jersey-American Water Company wishes to further extend the option for an additional twelve (12) months from November 7, 2016 to November 6, 2017.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Borough Council of the Borough of Washington that:

- 1. The Option Agreement with New Jersey-American Water Company is hereby extended for an additional twelve (12) months from November 7, 2016 to November 7, 2017.
- 2. The non-refundable option fee for the twelve (12) month extension period shall be \$14,000.00 payable on or before November 7.
- 3. All option payments shall be credited against the final easement purchase price of \$140,000.00.

Resolution #165-2016 – Resolution Appointing Borough Manager Matthew C. Hall

RESOLUTION 165-2016 RESOLUTION APPOINTING BOROUGH MANAGER MATTHEW C. HALL

WHEREAS, the Borough of Washington desires to employ the services of Matthew C. Hall as Borough Manager for the Borough of Washington, Warren County, NJ, pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40:69A-92; and

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A 40:82-2 provides that the Borough must reside within the Borough; and

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A 40:82-2 also provides for a waiver of the residency requirement upon approval of the municipal governing body.

NOW THERFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Washington as follows:

- 1. Matthew C. Hall is hereby appointed Borough Manager effective November 3, 2016
- 2. Matthew C. Hall shall be compensated at the annualized rate of \$80,000 for the first six (6) months of his employment
- 3. Upon a favorable performance review by the Governing Body after six (6) months of employment, the annual compensation shall be increased to an annualized rate of \$83,000
- 4. The Borough Manager's benefits shall be as provided for by Borough Policy, Code and/or New Jersey State Statutes
- 5. The residency requirement set forth in N.J.S.A. 40:82-2 is hereby waived for Borough Manager, Matthew C. Hall to permit residency within a ten (10) mile radius of the Borough of Washington.

Resolution #166-2016 – A Resolution of the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Washington Endorsing and Supporting the Passage of Assembly No. 3686 Designated as "Ralph and David's Law"

RESOLUTION 166-2016
RESOLUTION OF THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF
THE BOROUGH OF WASHINGTON
ENDORSING AND SUPPORTING THE PASSAGE OF ASSEMBLY, NO. 3686
DESIGNATED AS "RALPH AND DAVID'S LAW"

- **WHEREAS**, on February 26, 2004, David Heim, a thirteen year old boy was tragically killed by a drunk driver in Sussex County; and
- WHEREAS, the drunk driver who hit David was convicted solely of drunk driving and served only thirty days in jail, the maximum term of imprisonment for a first offense under the State's Drunk Driving Law; and
- **WHEREAS**, another tragic death occurred on May 5, 2012 when Ralph Politi, Jr., an East Hanover Township community activist and business owner, was killed by a drunk driver who swerved out of her lane and struck him as he stood by his parked pick-up truck; and
- **WHEREAS**, in the case of Ralph Politi, the drunk driver was recently acquitted of first-degree aggravated manslaughter and second-degree vehicular homicide, and instead received a two-year suspension of her driver's license and was ordered to perform thirty days of community service and pay \$733.00 in fines and penalties; and
- **WHEREAS**, as a result of the untimely deaths of both David Heim and Ralph Politi, and the penalty limitations imposed by current law, members of both sides of the aisle have crafted Assembly, No. 3686, which establishes the crime of strict liability vehicular homicide and the conditions under which a defendant may be charged with such a violation; and
- **WHEREAS**, under Assembly, No. 3686, strict liability vehicular homicide would be a third-degree crime, but neither the presumption of non-imprisonment that normally applies to first-time offenders convicted of third-degree crimes, nor the causal requirements of **N.J.S.A.** 2C:2-3, would apply; and
- **WHEREAS**, Assembly, No. 3686 would also amend various sections of statutory law to strengthen penalties for vehicular homicide caused by drunk or drugged drivers; and
- **WHEREAS**, Assembly, No. 3686 would be known as "Ralph and David's Law" in honor of Ralph Politi and David Heim; and
- **WHEREAS**, the Borough Council of the Borough of Washington applauds the bi-partisan efforts of members of the General Assembly in strengthening the penalty provisions for operating a vehicle or vessel under the influence of drugs or alcohol, closing any loopholes that would set a violator free.
- **NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Washington in the County of Warren and State of New Jersey as follows:
 - 1. The Governing Body endorses and supports the bi-partisan efforts of the General Assembly in the introduction of Assembly, No. 3686, which establishes the third-degree crime of strict liability vehicular homicide, amends various sections of statutory law, and designates Assembly, No. 3686 as "Ralph and David's Law.

2. Certified copies of this resolution shall be transmitted to these sponsors of Assembly, No. 3686, namely Assemblymen John F. McKeon and Anthony M. Bucco, Assemblywomen Mila M. Jasey, Nancy F. Munoz, and Valerie Vainieri Huttle, Assembly Speaker Vincent Prieto, Senate President Stephen M. Sweeny, and the New Jersey State League of Municipalities.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Washington that a handicapped parking space be designate at 94 Youmans Avenue with a sign and curb painting.

Resolution 168-2016 – Resolution Authorizing a Memorandum of Understanding between the Borough of Washington and the Warren Hills Regional High School

RESOLUTION 168-2016 RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING A MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN THE BOROUGH OF WASHINGTON AND THE WARREN HILLS REGIONAL MIDDLE SCHOOL

WHEREAS, storm drainage system upgrades are required at the southwest and northwest corner of the alleyway in the vicinity of its intersection with Lincoln Avenue and within the area of the Warren Hills Regional Middle School parking lot, and

WHEREAS, the alleyway is owned and maintained by the Borough of Washington and is routinely utilized by the Warren Hills Regional School District as a means of ingress and egress in connection with the transportation of students to and from the Warren Hills Regional Middle School, and

WHEREAS, the Borough and the School District agree that the upgrades to the drainage system in the alleyway will benefit the Borough, the School District and local residents, and

WHEREAS, the Borough and the School District are desirous to enter into a Memorandum of Understanding to set out the arrangements that each of the parties agree are necessary to complete the storm drainage system upgrade project, and

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Washington that a Memorandum of Understanding between the Borough and the School District with the following provisions is hereby authorized:

- 1. The Storm Drainage Upgrade Project includes the replacement of an existing field inlet and basin with a double field inlet and precast concrete in the Middle School parking lot; construction of a new field inlet over an existing 15% storm drain at the southwest corner of the alleyway and Lincoln Avenue; closure of an existing filed inlet at the northwest corner of the intersection of the alleyway and Lincoln Avenue; installation of a 15" HDPE Stormwater pipe between the new basins; and milling and overlay of the disturbed pavement,
- 2. The Parties agree to share equally in the cost of the Project in an amount up to \$7,000.00 in order to reduce the financial impact on both entities, with the responsible for all costs in excess of \$7,000.00,
- 3. The District agrees to remit payment of \$3,500.00 to the Borough upon the Borough's commencement of the work. To the extent that the cost to complete the Project is less than \$7,000.00, the Borough will refund the School District its share of the reduced cost,
- 4. The Borough agrees to complete the project at no additional cost to the School District, and
- 5. The School District agrees to cooperate with the Borough with respect to scheduling of the project and access by Borough employees and representatives onto District property for the purpose of undertaking the Storm Drainage Upgrade Project.

Resolution 170 -2016 - Resolution Authorizing Settlement Agreement and Release of Claims with Washington Community Solar, et al

RESOLUTION 170-2016 RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT AND RELEASE OF CLAIMS WITH WASHINGTON COMMUNITY SOLAR, ET AL

WHEREAS, the Borough of Washington (Borough) and Washington Community Solar (WCS)entered into a Power Purchase Agreement on December 30, 2011 which had subsequently been amended four (4) times, and

WHEREAS, Energy in the Bank (EIB) and GEP Solar Farms, LLC (GEP) acquired WCS in 2014, and

WHEREAS, GEP is an affiliate of Solar Development Group, LLC (SDG),

WHEREAS, EIB and GEP sold and conveyed WCS and its assets to GES Megafive, LLC (GES) in 2015, and

WHEREAS, a dispute has arisen between WCS and the Borough whether there exists an obligation for WCS to pave an 800-foot roadway in connection with the PPA,

WHEREAS, as a result of this dispute, the Borough has refused to issue a Certificate of Completion and sign Certificate Completion Form B for the solar project contemplated by the PPA, and

WHEREAS, all parties agree that it is in their respective best interests to resolve all claim raised by all parties.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Washington that a settlement agreement between the Borough and EIB, GEP, SDG, GES and WCS is authorized wherein EIB, GEP, SDG and GES, on behalf of WCS will make a settlement payment of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) to the Borough and the Borough shall promptly sign and deliver the required Certificate of Completion and Certificate of Completion Form B for both the roof mount and ground mount solar projects, provided, however that Certificates of Approval for the roof mount and ground mount have been furnished.
