BOROUGH OF WASHINGTON, WARREN COUNTY, NEW JERSEY WASHINGTON BOROUGH COUNCIL MINUTES -February 20, 2018

The Regular Meeting of the Borough Council of Washington, Warren County, New Jersey was held in the Council Chambers of Borough Hall at 7:00 P.M.

Roll Call: Heinrich, Higgins, Klimko, Noone and Thompson. Absent: Norris and Valle.

Also, Present: Matthew Hall, Manager Laurie A. Barton Borough Clerk Leslie Parikh, Attorney

Mayor Higgins led everyone in the flag salute. A moment of silence was taken for the tragedy that occurred at the Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida.

Mayor Higgins read the following Statement into the Record:

"The requirements of the 'Open Public Meetings Law, 1975, Chapter 231' have been satisfied in that adequate notice of this meeting has been published in the Star Gazette and posted on the Bulletin Board of Borough Hall stating the time, place and purpose of the meeting as required by law."

COUNCIL APPEARANCE

John Monteverde, BID, distributed packets to everyone of information with upcoming events including a sponsorship application. Mr. Monteverde thanked those who helped at the recognition event.

Daniel (last name inaudible), Attorney with Local Government Services, stated he was here on behalf of the Washington Square Homeowners Association. Discussion of the borough not defaulting on the bond ensued. It was asked that the borough not withdraw so that pressure is on the developer to complete the work.

<u>Michelle Beatty, Attorney representing Elizabethtown Gas, stated she is working with Attorney</u> Parikh on some details concerning the franchise ordinance that is due for a public hearing at the March 6th meeting.

<u>Rachel Smyogi(sp) Carlton Avenue</u>, discussed a power line wire that was ripped down by a tree that needs to be trimmed. A call was placed to the Shade Tree Committee to get the tree trimmed that hangs half way across the road. Ms. Smyogi stated she had to pay an electrician for two hours of work to restore the power.

<u>Debbie Spink, State St.</u>, thanked the Street committee for meeting with her and asked for any updates that can be shared. Lengthy discussions ensued regarding the ordinance and re-assessing the no parking ordinance citing that the street was mis-measured originally and is wider than what was stated in the original Engineers report.

Motion made by Heinrich to amend the original ordinance to that street (State Street). Motion seconded by Noone.

Discussion

Attorney Parikh explained that it will only affect that portion of the ordinance to take away the no parking.

Roll call: Heinrich, Higgins, Klimko, Noone and Thompson.

Ayes: 3 Nays: 2 (Klimko and Thompson) Motion carried.

<u>Ethel Conry</u>, stated that a letter from a teacher received from the high school where the tragedy took place is asking all communities to send a letter to the school to support the kids when they come back into session. Mayor Higgins stated he will write the letter once he receives the information from Ms. Conry.

Hearing no other public comment, motion made by Heinrich and seconded by Klimko to

close the audience portion.

ORDINANCE 2018-02 CALENDAR YEAR 2018 ORDINANCE TO EXCEED THE MUNICIPAL BUDGET APPROPRIATION LIMITS AND TO ESTABLISH A CAP BANK (N.J.S.A. 40A: 4-45.14)

WHEREAS, the Local Government Cap Law, N.J.S. 40A: 4-45.1 et seq., provides that in the preparation of its annual budget, a municipality shall limit any increase in said budget up to 2.5% unless authorized by ordinance to increase it to 3.5% over the previous year's final appropriations, subject to certain exceptions; and,

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A. 40A: 4-45.15a provides that a municipality may, when authorized by ordinance, appropriate the difference between the amount of its actual final appropriation and the 3.5% percentage rate as an exception to its final appropriations in either of the next two succeeding years; and,

WHEREAS, the Borough of Washington in the County of Warren finds it advisable and necessary to increase its CY 2018 budget by up to 3.5% over the previous year's final appropriations, in the interest of promoting the health, safety and welfare of the citizens; and,

WHEREAS, the Borough of Washington hereby determines that a 1 % increase in the budget for said year, amounting to \$31,765.95 in excess of the increase in final appropriations otherwise permitted by the Local Government Cap Law, is advisable and necessary; and,

WHEREAS the Borough of Washington hereby determines that any amount authorized hereinabove that is not appropriated as part of the final budget shall be retained as an exception to final appropriation in either of the next two succeeding years.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED, by the Borough of Washington, in the County of Warren, a majority of the full authorized membership of this governing body affirmatively concurring, that, in the CY 2018 budget year, the final appropriations of the Washington Borough shall, in accordance with this ordinance and N.J.S.A. 40A: 4-45.14, be increased by 3.5 %, amounting to \$ 111,180.79, and that the CY 2018 municipal budget for the Washington Borough be approved and adopted in accordance with this ordinance; and,

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that any that any amount authorized hereinabove that is not appropriated as part of the final budget shall be retained as an exception to final appropriation in either of the next two succeeding years; and,

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that a certified copy of this ordinance as introduced be filed with the Director of the Division of Local Government Services within 5 days of introduction; and,

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that a certified copy of this ordinance upon adoption, with the recorded vote included thereon, be filed with said Director within 5 days after such adoption.

WHEREAS, bids were received from Blue Diamond Disposal as well as LMR Disposal for both regular garbage pickup and bulk trash pickup; and

WHEREAS, at the time of the bid opening Blue Diamond Disposal was not the apparent lowest bidder; and

WHEREAS, after litigation a Superior Court judge ruled upon defects in the apparent low bidder's bid package and Blue Diamond Disposal was awarded the base bid; and

WHEREAS, after careful consideration the Borough of Washington desires to award Blue Diamond Disposal bulk trash collection for the contract term 2018-2020 based upon the original bid submitted; and

WHEREAS, Blue Diamond Disposal has agreed to absorb 50% of the cost of tonnage fees normally borne by the Borough for bulk trash collection only; and

WHEREAS, the CFO has certified that the funds will be available upon adoption of the 2018 budget from line item 01-2018-26-305-2-28;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Borough of Washington authorizes that Blue Diamond Disposal be awarded the 2018-2020 contract for bulk trash collection and;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Qualified Purchasing Agent issue the appropriate purchase order in the amount of \$36,000 for 2018.

RESOLUTION 2018-35 SELF-EXAMINATION OF BUDGET RESOLUTION [as required by DCA]

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A. 40A:4-78b has authorized the Local Finance Board to adopt rules that permit municipalities in sound fiscal condition to assume the responsibility, normally granted to the Director of the Division of Local Government Services, of conducting the annual budget examination; and

WHEREAS, N.J.A.C. 5:30-7 was adopted by the Local Finance Board on February 11, 1997; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to N.J.A.C. 5:30-7.2 through 7.5, the *Borough of Washington* has been declared eligible to participate in the program by the Division of Local Government Services, and the Chief Financial officer has determined that the local government meets the necessary conditions to participate in the program for the 2018 budget year.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the governing body of the *Borough of Washington* that in accordance with N.J.A.C. 5:30-7.6a & 7.6b and based upon the Chief Financial Officer's certification, the governing body has found the budget has met the following requirements:

1. That with reference to the following items, the amounts have been calculated pursuant to law and appropriated as such in the budget:

- a. Payment of interest and debt redemption charges
- b. Deferred charges and statutory expenditures
- c. Cash deficit of preceding year
- d. Reserve for uncollected taxes
- e. Other reserves and non-disbursement items
- f. Any inclusions of amounts required for school purposes.

2. That the provisions relating to limitation on increases of appropriations pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40A:4-45.2 and appropriations for exceptions to limits on appropriations found at N.J.S.A. 40A:4-45.3 et seq., are fully met (complies with CAP law).

3. That the budget is in such form, arrangement, and content as required by the Local Budget Law and N.J.A.C. 5:30-4 and 5:30-5.

- 4. That pursuant to the Local Budget Law:
 - a. All estimates of revenue are reasonable, accurate and correctly stated,
 - b. Items of appropriation are properly set forth
 - c. In itemization, form, arrangement and content, the budget will permit the exercise of the comptroller function within the municipality.

5. The budget and associated amendments have been introduced and publicly advertised in accordance with the relevant provisions of the Local Budget Law, except that failure to meet the deadlines of N.J.S.A. 40A:4-5 shall not prevent such certification.

6. That all other applicable statutory requirements have been fulfilled.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution will be forwarded to the Director of the Division of Local Government Services upon adoption.

<u>RESOLUTION CLARIFYING HOURS OF WORK RULES FOR UNCLASSIFIED AND</u> <u>EXEMPT EMPLOYEES GOVERNED BY THE FAIR LABOR STANDARDS ACT</u>

WHEREAS, the Borough of Washington employs unclassified personnel governed by the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA) who are classified as exempt employees and as such, are not entitled to compensatory time or overtime regardless of hours worked; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to §213 of the FLSA it is permissible to require these employees to track their hours worked via a time and labor system; and

WHEREAS, the Borough of Washington, for reasons of greater efficiency in time and labor recordkeeping as well as accountability, has elected to utilize an electronic time and labor system for all employees which incorporates biometric time clocks; and

WHEREAS, the Borough's time and labor system and time clocks, as programmed, are unable to accurately account for the working hours of unclassified and exempt personnel; and

WHEREAS, it is the Borough's desire that the Borough's time and labor system and time clocks be programmed so as to account for the working hours of unclassified and exempt employees as set forth in the policy attached hereto.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Washington authorize the policy on hours of work for unclassified and exempt employees which is set forth in in the memorandum of understanding attached hereto, and that the policy be forwarded to Primepoint in order for the Borough's time and labor system and time clocks to be updated accordingly;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Borough Clerk will forward a copy of same along with a certified copy of this resolution to the Administrative Clerk and direct the Administrative Clerk to implement the work rules promulgated therein in the time and labor system.

<u>Green Team:</u> A grant carried over from last year will be used to start planting which will be on a proposed date of April 21st.

Mayor Higgins inquired about trouble with the email server. There are two buildings downtown being under renovation. Jan Riga spoke with the manager about alternate funding routes for municipal infrastructure. Mayor Higgins stated they will be looking into how they can use it for Washington.

Mayor Higgins reported that the he was contacted by Senator Doherty's office; the Borough received a \$90,000 grant for Safe Routes to School.
