The Regular Meeting of the Borough Council of Washington, Warren County, New Jersey was held in the Council Chambers of Borough Hall at 7:00 P.M.

Roll Call: Heinrich, Higgins, Klimko, Noone, Norris, Thompson, Valle.

Mayor Higgins led everyone in the flag salute.

Mayor Higgins read the following Statement into the Record:

NEW BUSINESS

Motion made by Klimko and seconded by Valle to approve the Washington PTO Raffle licenses, motion.

Ayes: 7 Nays: 0 Motion Carried.

Mayor Higgins administered the Oath of Office to Derek Martino, as Fire Lieutenant.

Mayor Higgins presented the following Proclamation honoring the years of service as named:

PROCLAMATION

HONORING THE NEARLY ONE HUNDRED SIXTY YEARS OF SERVICE OF STEVEN ALPAUGH, RUDOLPH BESCHERER, CHARLES WEBER, JOSHUA DEVOE AND JOSEPH FOX, SR. TO THE WASHINGTON FIRE DEPARTMENT

WHEREAS, it is the intention of the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Washington to honor the service of long serving members of the Washington Fire Department; and

WHEREAS, there are five members of the Washington Fire Department having given more than twenty years of service to the department as well as the Borough of Washington; and

WHEREAS, the combined service of the aforesaid members totals one hundred and fifty-seven years; and

WHEREAS, Steven Alpaugh joined the Washington Fire Department in 1977, served as Chief from 1994 to 1995 and again from 2002-2003, currently serves as the Warren County Fire Coordinator, and continues to take an active role in training new firefighters; and

WHEREAS, Rudolph Bescherer joined the Washington Fire Department in 1978 and leads the department in calls, having responded to over 1,200 since 2014, and currently oversees the junior firefighter program of the Washington Fire Department; and

WHEREAS, Charles Weber joined the Washington Fire Department in 1990, holding multiple positions with the department including Line Officer and Trustee, and serving on multiple truck committees, and currently oversees the driver training program; and

WHEREAS, Joshua DeVoe joined the Washington Fire Department in 1993, holding multiple Line Officer positions including Lieutenant, Captain, and Assistant Chief, and currently remains active in training new firefighters; and

WHEREAS, Joseph Fox, Sr. joined the Washington Fire Department in 1991, has held multiple Line Officer positions as well as Desk Officer positions, and served as Chief from 2004 to 2005 and currently serves as the Director of the Warren County Fire Academy; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Council see it fit to honor these men as members of the Washington Fire Department and as proud sons of the Borough of Washington, exemplifying the values that make Washington strong;

A motion made by Noone and seconded by Klimko to pass a resolution of support to Senate Bill 1597. Motion was tabled for Attorney review.

Discussions of the bulk stickers and extending the time for when residents can put their items out ensued.

VOUCHERS AND CLAIMS

Motion made by Heinrich seconded by Noone to pay the vouchers and claims in the amount of \$1,513,598.17 from the current fund and \$19,136.09 from sewer.

ROLL CALL: Heinrich, Higgins, Klimko, Noone, Norris, Thompson and Valle. Ayes: 7, Nays: 0 Abstention: Thompson abstains from any Fire and EMS bills. Motion Carried.

COUNCIL REMARKS

Councilwoman Klimko asked if there was any update on Prospect Street.

Councilman Thompson thanked the Fire Company members for their years of service and the DPW for being out in the storm cleaning things up.

Mayor Higgins thanked the Fire Company for their service and years of service.
