Mayor Higgins led everyone in the flag salute.

Mayor Higgins read the following statement into record:

ORDINANCE 2nd Reading

Motion made by Norris and seconded by Noone to open the public hearing for Ordinance 2020-06.

Hearing no public comment, motion to close the public hearing made by Noone and seconded by Conry, all were in favor.

Motion made by Conry and seconded by Norris to adopt Ordinance 2020-06.

Roll Call: Conry, Cox, Duchemin, Noone, Norris, Valle and Higgins. Ayes: 6, Nays: 1 (Cox) Motion passes.

ORDINANCE 2020-06 CALENDAR YEAR 2020 ORDINANCE TO EXCEED THE MUNICIPAL BUDGET APPROPRIATION LIMITS AND TO ESTABLISH A CAP BANK (N.J.S.A. 40A: 4-45.14)

WHEREAS, the Local Government Cap Law, N.J.S. 40A: 4-45.1 et seq., provides that in the preparation of its annual budget, a municipality shall limit any increase in said budget up to 2.5% unless authorized by ordinance to increase it to 3.5% over the previous year's final appropriations, subject to certain exceptions; and,

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A. 40A: 4-45.15a provides that a municipality may, when authorized by ordinance, appropriate the difference between the amount of its actual final appropriation and the 3.5% percentage rate as an exception to its final appropriations in either of the next two succeeding years; and,

WHEREAS, the Borough Council of the Borough of Washington in the County of Warren finds it advisable and necessary to increase its CY 2020 budget by up to 3.5% over the previous year's final appropriations, in the interest of promoting the health, safety and welfare of the citizens; and,

WHEREAS, the Borough Council hereby determines that a 3.5 % increase in the budget for said year, amounting to \$ 33,729.23 in excess of the increase in final appropriations otherwise permitted by the Local Government Cap Law, is advisable and necessary; and,

WHEREAS the Borough Council hereby determines that any amount authorized hereinabove that is not appropriated as part of the final budget shall be retained as an exception to final appropriation in either of the next two succeeding years.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED, by the Borough Council of the Washington Borough, in the County of Warren, a majority of the full authorized membership of this governing body affirmatively concurring, that, in the CY 2020 budget year, the final appropriations of the Borough of Washington shall, in accordance with this ordinance and N.J.S.A. 40A: 4-45.14, be increased by 3.5 %, amounting to \$118,052.30, and that the CY 2020 municipal budget for the Borough of Washington be approved and adopted in accordance with this ordinance; and,

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that any that any amount authorized hereinabove that is not appropriated as part of the final budget shall be retained as an exception to final appropriation in either of the next two succeeding years; and,

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that a certified copy of this ordinance as introduced be filed with the Director of the Division of Local Government Services within 5 days of introduction; and,

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that a certified copy of this ordinance upon adoption, with the recorded vote included thereon, be filed with said Director within 5 days after such adoption.

Motion made by Norris and seconded by Conry to open the public hearing for the 2020 Budget.

Motion made by Noone and seconded by Conry to introduce Resolution 2020-75 Amending the 2020 Budget. Public hearing scheduled for May 19, 2020.

RESOLUTION AFFIRMING SUPPORT FOR THE WARREN COUNTY BOARD OF CHOSEN FREEHOLDERS' RESOLUTIONS REQUESTING THE STATE AND FEDERAL GOVERNMENTS TO IMMEDIATELTY ALLOCATE CRITICALLY NEEDED EMERGENCY AND ECONOMIC FUNDING TO THE COUNTY OF WARREN FOR THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC

AND

IMPLORING THE GOVERNORS OF NEW JESEY AND PENNSYLVANIA, AS WELL AS THE BOARDS OF TRUSTEES OF ST. LUKE'S UNIVERSITY HEALTH NETWORK AND THE LEHIGH VALLEY HEALTH NETWORK, TO PROMULGATE UPDATED PROTOCOLS REGARDING OBSTETRICAL LABOR, DELIVERY AND VISITATION

WHEREAS, in response to the deadly COVID-19 ("Corona Virus") pandemic the Borough of Washington has continued to work closely with the County of Warren on a coordinated and comprehensive response in order to mitigate the impact upon our residents as well as our economy; and

WHEREAS, the County of Warren has continuously demonstrated exceptional leadership during this period of time as well as an unprecedented level of cooperation with its municipal partners; and

- Stated condolences to the LUB secretary and borough families in the loss of their family members.

- Plans being made on running the Farmers Market with new protocols.

Deputy Mayor Conry gave the following statements:

• Got volunteers to come out and help do shopping for the seniors and those with disabilities. Thanked Councilwoman Duchemin for getting the message out on Facebook.

Borough Clerk Laurie Barton expressed her gratitude to those on Council who supported her by re-appointing her as Borough Clerk and Registrar.
